It's a saying that we are all familiar with. To live in today. To not burden ourselves or daydream about what once was or what could have been in our lives. To not become too preoccupied with what we hope will happen in the future. Instead, to live today for the sake of today.

Yet, here we are, entering the month of November and the tail end of the Fall season. It's a challenge to keep hope going as the last leaf falls off the tree, as the first crunch of the ground swallows life beneath us – as nature moves this time of the year in Pittsburgh, in the U.S., and around the world.

It's a struggle to keep faithful or even to keep your spirits up as night takes over the day, as darkness creeps more and more into the light, as the temperatures continue to drop, and eventually snow accumulates by the feet everywhere from our driveways and sidewalks, to our lawns and flowerbeds, and on our streets. I don't know about all of you, but it takes me a few days to adjust to the fact that it's becoming darker and darker in the morning hours and that it's becoming darker and darker at night, especially the time right before we adjust our clocks back for Daylight Savings Time.

Let's be honest, depending on your current reality, it can be very easy to dwell on the past or to spend too much time worrying about or daydreaming about the future. It's much more of a challenge to only stay in the present, especially depending on the day when that present provides its own series of challenges or worries to occupy the busy days and anxious nights.

Instead, to let todays' worries and troubles be enough for today. And to leave tomorrow's concerns for tomorrow. Which, even I will admit is very hard to do. With anxiety in the economy from high fuel and grocery costs, the upcoming elections at the local, state, and federal levers, the divisiveness in our society as a whole, and all of the other personal matters which weigh on our hearts and minds on any given day, it can be easy to want to wish things were at the abracadabra point of everything being "ok" again.

As the Holy Spirit would have it, our texts this month are all about the present, namely the promise of hope and resurrection and life and blessings which are given and bestowed in the present tense. The texts that we will have this month will all point to a hope and a promise which is given and bestowed to you and I, today. In the present. Not in the past and not in the future, but today.

The texts that we will hear in worship on Sunday mornings this month will beckon us to hear, in no uncertain terms, that it is in just this time that the faithful (you and me and all believers in Christ) are called to be what they and we are: namely, faithful. Having already been grasped by the One who will never ever let us go, we cling to faith that not only sustains us but which raises the dead.

We are called to remember the dead in hope, just as we will on All Saints Sunday on November 3rd. We are called to not be alarmed when faced with trials and temptations in the world, which we will hear about on November 10th. We will be called to worship at the feet of Christ who is King and Lord over all, as we will on November 24th for Christ the King Sunday. And then we will begin to prepare Him room in our hearts and minds as we enter into the Advent season on December 1st.




ELECTION PRAYER: As we move forward to November's election let us remember that, regardless of our political perspectives, we are all children of God. Please consider making the following part of your prayer life.

ZION GARDEN NEWS CREATION CARE

Do you know that Zion is one of the few churches in our Synod with multiple gardens? Those of you who helped advocate for Regenerative Agriculture know what an important role plants play in keeping our planet cool and in sequestering large amounts of carbon in their flowers, stems and roots! As a parishioner you can be proud that Zion is living out the words of our ELCA Social Statement, Caring for Creation; Vision, Hope and Justice,

"Christian concern for the environment is shaped by the Word of God spoken in creation and the Breath of God daily renewing the face of the earth." The Zion gardens were originally planted to provide vegetables for our Food Bank, with Zion members from the Penn Hills area faithfully tending and watering them throughout the summer months. Four years ago it was decided to rent the gardens out to Zion and community members individually, with the proceeds earmarked for the Food Bank. Because no one opted for this arrangement, the past three years have seen the gardens voluntarily financed, fertilized, planted, watered and maintained by several Zion members. They have been mostly planted with lovely deer resistant (kinda) State Fair zinnias and marigolds, as well as tasty herbs and garlic! While most congregations place cut flowers on the altar, when Zion members worship outdoors with the "Land and Seasons" service, we have a truly "living altar" in our own gardens! This year, in preparation for winter, three gardens have been planted with the "cover crops" of red and white clover, one with delicious garlic and one with the native pollinator plants wing stem, bee balm, goldenrod, milkweed, false indigo, spiderwort and aster. To know exactly how environmentally important our Zion gardens are, join us for viewing the documentary "Common Ground," to be shown after church on Sunday, November 10th

Update from the Long-Range Planning Team

Dear Fellow Zion Members:

Did you know the Church Council has a constitutional mandate to do long-range planning? To help fulfill this, the council moved to hire Pastor Graham Standish. He has helped many churches in the area, after membership tripled and attendance doubled at his church in Zelienople, PA. His method is to form a group representing the congregation and including the pastor. They then do the legwork and study to create a proposal as the final output. The process is in-depth and takes 8 -12 months to complete. We have provided updates on our work every month. Now we are moving on to the last phase, the proposal development. Graham suggested we offer this summary of what we have done and what is up next.

After Graham was brought on, he asked Pastor Martha to assemble a group of members that was both representative of the church's past, its present, and its future. We began our work in earnest in January of this year.

We started by reviewing several books and a film. These books and the DVD are all available in our library. They all pertain to strategic thinking, rebirth, and/or following the lead of the Holy Spirit. We discussed our views, memories, and hopes for Zion in relation to these thought-provoking works:

Think Again - Grant

Start with Why - Sinek

The Grace Outpouring - Godwin and Davis

Switch - Heath & Heath

The Jesus Revolution (2023)

After this phase, we began exploring strong local churches that have experienced success and growth. The goal was never to impose their style on Zion. Yet they are doing some things very well, and there are things we can learn and use here. We visited two churches whose worship style was inviting, especially toward people who had walked away from more typical churches. We also visited a historically black church on the North Side to help us better understand being a church in a changing area. Finally, we had a video visit with a Lutheran pastor from the area who is growing his church.

Now we ask for your prayers as we enter this closing step. We will synthesize all our work into a document that we will share with the Church Council and then with the congregation. It will contain suggestions for improving our church life and growing our congregation. This document will challenge us all to move into the future so that Zion will be a vibrant church now and into the future.


